Archaeology in Coleford Parish

Much of the archaeology discovered in Coleford parish bear testament to the long association that the town has had with mining and quarrying. The most significant early archaeological finds in Coleford date from the late Iron Age and Roman Periods. Most of these finds have been located in the south of the parish probably associated with the extensive iron mining in the scowles around Puzzle Wood and the Stock Farm Roman villa site which lie just south-west of the parish boundary. Hoards of Roman coins have been found at both Perrygrove Wood, to the west of Tufthorn Avenue, close to the site of the miniature railway, and at Tufthorn. Each of these contained several thousand coins in earthenware jars. Roman coins and pottery were also discovered at High Nash during the construction of the early twentieth century council housing. A Bronze Age palstave has also been retrieved from High Nash, and a Bronze Age axe head found elsewhere in the parish. Another significant archaeological discovery in Coleford occurred during the construction of the Mushet Industrial Park and housing off Old Station Way to the south-south-east of the town centre. Part of a late Iron Age and Romano-British temple complex was unearthed, much of it dating to the early 4th century AD. The temple and its apse was located at the entrance to what is now Roman Way. One hundred metres north-north-west of the temple site, the weaponry of a 1st century AD Celtic warrior was found. This consisted of the remains of a circular shield, parts from a sword harness and an iron sword bent double. These finds are consistent with a Celtic warrior burial. Iron

Age pottery was found close by. Unfortunately, most of this site was developed before more extensive excavation could take place.

Elsewhere in the parish there have been scatterings of flint finds [e.g. Mile End and Owens Farm], evidence of fish and mill ponds [e.g. Pool Green], medieval ridge and furrow [e.g. Buchanan Recreation Ground and Bone Hill] and ancient routeways and hollow ways [e.g. Whitecliff and Rock Lane].

However, the most prolific, and often, the most obvious archaeological features to be found in Coleford parish are linked to its history of mineral extraction and processing. Below ground at Cinderhill and running down into Coleford town are the remains of massive iron ore slag and cinder deposits accumulated over a long time period, possibly from the early Iron Age to the 16th century. Above ground there are two major sites. Firstly, the Whitecliff Furnace complex, a scheduled monument to the south-west of the town centre and secondly, the remains of the Dark Hill Iron Works to the south-east of the parish. This site is also a scheduled monument. Close to this site are the remains of the Titanic Steel Works, of which very little remains.

These sites and the earlier mineral activities have left their mark throughout the parish both in the urban area and in the surrounding countryside. Besides the scowles, many small pits and quarries are obvious in the landscape, as are the tramroads, often with the stones that held the rails still evident, and the course of former railways.

Whitecliff Furnace is the remains of the former Whitecliff Iron Works where early and important smelting experiments took place to improve the production of iron. It was in operation from 1796 until 1816 and it was to work at this furnace that David Mushet, a leading metallurgist of his generation, came to Coleford. However by 1812 David Mushet had moved from Whitecliff to work with his son Robert Forester Mushet at Darkhill. One furnace survives substantially. The site also contains 2 post medieval lime kilns and a small quarry.

Dark Hill Iron and Brick Works has been partially excavated and includes standing and buried remains. The site is associated with the Mushet family, especially Robert Mushet. They were pioneers in the development of iron and steel technology in the 19th century and produced the first steel for railway use. Dark Hill was the site of a Bessemer furnace by which Robert Mushet revolutionised the method of steel production. The site shows the features of a complete 19th century ironworks including a tramway for moving materials and products.
